
"A NEW DAWN OUT OF DARKNESS"

I still remember it well, so many years ago! I was invited whilst at theological college, training for the priesthood, to spend Holy Week and Easter here in Suffolk, at Hengrave Hall. It was in the early 1980s, an Ecumenical centre of some renown for lay and ordained of different traditions, living together 'in community'.

What marked this out in my memory was our keeping of a whole week together and literally eating and sleeping, this special week of prayer, liturgy, and communion, each with the other. The highlight and new to me at the time, was the Saturday '**Vigil**', the night before Easter Sunday morning - involving a bonfire, an Easter Candle which was ritually blessed and 'adorned' with the five nails (wounds) of Christ – from which all our individual candles were lit for the 'Vigil' of readings from the Old Testament and the New. This candlelit 'hearing' of our 'salvation history' and the great biblical, redemptive stories of death and new life was only part 2 of this unfolding drama.

What is it that we were waiting for expectantly to hear and then welcome? Yes, you guessed it. The dawn of Resurrection joy, that first Easter Eucharist of thanksgiving (part 4 following the renewal of our baptismal vows) in which we made as much possible noise as we could muster with the 'Gloria' ending Lent – whether we sounded whistles, trumpets, gongs, you name it – anything that heralded the great news of Christ, Risen from the dead, triumphant, victorious as the Easter tomb was burst open – and the remnants of crucifixion laid bare.



You only have to see that amazing picture by Piero della Francesca. for example, with this maiestic Christ figure literally leaning his left leg on the opened tomb holding the banner of victory held high, and the sleeping Roman soldiers below. It tells us something earth shattering and wonderful has happened.

It is this 'atmosphere' which we re-enact through our liturgy in our small country parishes, the night before Easter morn dawns. I warmly invite you to witness what our third centurv Christian shared and forebears celebrated as together; we darkness move from to

Resurrection light. And this year is so poignant when we reflect on today's 'Holy Land' where our Lord lived and died so cruelly. Easter is a truth and joy for every generation, culture and nationality to embrace and discover afresh, not least the gift of lasting peace and reconciliation.

At Hengrave Hall in an Easter past, I would say that I experienced something much bigger and greater than our individual 'histories', memories or, religious affiliations. Where this Season really touches the blue paper and takes off...is in the taking part.

So please come and join us for our first Easter Feast - at 7.30pm on this holy night – and hear the 'Alleluias' resound near you! Come and meet our new Director of Music too, James, who will be leading our choir, with Sarah accompanying on our fine Great Bealings organ. There will also be wine and cheese to enjoy afterwards!


There will be a small wake at Little Bealings Village Hall on the afternoon of Saturday the 13th of April. 2 - 4pm.

George was born in Ipswich and gained a scholarship place at Northqate Grammar (although spoke of being sent to the ' remedial' class for misbehaviour). As a child he was a Sea Cadet which sparked a lifelong love of sailing. After the war, National Service in the RAF was followed by teacher training and George returned to Suffolk to take up a position teaching metalwork at Farlingaye. He initially lived in Woodbridge on " Polly Garter" the boat he built himself but in 1963 bought a plot of land on Beacon Lane and had the bungalow built.

He loved to be involved in amateur dramatics and was a member of the Kesgrave Masque Players. Here he met Victoria Harris. They married and had 3 daughters, Joanna, Jessica and Gemma. George served for many years on Bealings Parish Council. As a practical man, who was never happier than when making or mending something, even when stepping back from other parish duties he continued to look after both the public footpaths within the parish and maintain the village hall. Since the death of Vicky in 2018, George continued to live independently. (even expanding his cooking repertoire) with the support of his family, and much-appreciated friends and neighbours. He is survived by his 3 daughters and 4 grandchildren.

NATURE NOTES - WOODPECKERS

Woodpeckers There is nothing quite like hearing a making holes in buildings or feeding on woodpecker tap-tapping away in a tree fruit crops. Viewers of Spring Watch will close to home. The rapid, insistent sound is one which suggests that spring may be just round the corner, with the local woodpecker doing what nature tells it to do and drilling deep into the trunk of a description nearby tree Woodpeckers characteristically forage for insect prey on the trunks and branches of trees, and that drumming with their beaks, which produces a reverberatory sound that can be heard at a considerable distance, can be a means of communication with other woodpeckers - spring and breeding are just round the corner. Some species of woodpecker vary their diet with fruits, birds' eggs, small animals, tree sap, human scraps, and carrion. They usually nest and roost in holes which they excavate in tree trunks. Their abandoned holes are of importance to other cavitynesting birds.



are found world-wide. Woodpeckers can antagonise humans by have seen them predating the chicks of smaller. less aggressive birds Disappointment at that aspect of their behaviour may be modified by any of the extraordinarv explanations as to how they have evolved anatomically, with an



extraordinarv combination of neck muscles, to produce that powerful highspeed tapping mechanism.

Their status in the bird world is made clear when they arrive at a bird table. The smaller birds tend to defer and scatter. That said, the sight of a greater spotted woodpecker at the bird table is an exhilarating one. It is a bird which dominates. Green woodpeckers are less likely to be seen at the bird table. Their diet of insects is usually to be found amongst expanses of grass. They are readily recognised by their low, swooping flight. There is also a lesser spotted woodpecker, but that is much smaller, and much rarer in these parts.

HISTORY CORNER

- SUFFOLK LOCAL HISTORY COUNCIL

For ex-teachers the temptation to share enthusiasms with others, certainly the vouna, but with the old sometimes aettina caught up in the slipstream, is something that never fades. Thank goodness! The late-in-life discovery of the fascination of local history which came through writing "Walking through History" has, for me, opened up paths leading in various unexpected directions. I was persuaded to become official "Recorder" for Great Bealings, and, having bought into that, found myself signed up as a member of the Suffolk Local History Council, a county-wide organization, which brings together people, both Local History and individuals, Societies who are interested in the historical roots of the places where they live.

Many fewer people now spend their whole lives in one locality. Those who do, are often those with the most fascinating stories to tell, sometimes unaware as to just how fascinating these stories can be For the majority of us, for others. nowadavs. life is a more itinerant experience. That should not, however, exclude us from the very real process of engaging with the historical roots of the places where we live. Such engagement increases the sense of belonging, be it very local, or more broadly, within a county.

In early March I attended the SLHC's Societies Day. The programme included a series of fascinating talks, the subjects of which I will mention, trying to give a flavour of the scope of this thing called local history. In just a few hours we heard about the witches of Halesworth,

Doodlebugs and V1 Rockets, the pre-war beginnings of Television, the restored 18th century Worlingworth fire engine, the new Food Museum near Stowmarket, the fascinating range of brickwork designs, a largely forgotten WW1 airfield, and exemptions from being called up to serve in WW1. An extraordinary range of topics – and every speaker showing eloquence, knowledge and enthusiasm. It was a day of unexpected discoveries.



If you think that History might be something from which you could derive enjoyment, together with a deeper knowledge of the county in which we live, then this Suffolk Local History Council could be for you. 

Summarised notes of the Parish Council meeting held on 12th March 2024.

UPDATES-FLOODING

Regan Scott (RS) reported that he had received a reply to his Freedom of Information request to SCC regarding the specifications for work relating to flooding prevention agreed in the new Highways contract with Milestone Infrastructure. He reported briefly on it, and will circulate a summary to Cllrs.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

On behalf of Stuart Curtis, the applicant for DC/24/0191 - Cherry Tree Cottage, Martin Last handed Cllrs some explanatory drawings regarding the scheme and further explained the current proposals.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

DC/24/0191/FUL - Cherry Tree Cottage, Seckford Hall Road - Demolition of existing garage and storage outbuildings and erection of new detached garage/ store with games room over. It was resolved unanimously to support this application.



DC/23/0319/LBC and DC/23/0363/FUL – Seckford Hall

REPORTS:

County Councillor Elaine Bryce, District Councillor Dan Clery, District Councillor Colin Hedgley (CH)

Reports have been circulated to CIIrs and full copies are attached to the minutes on the website. CH verbally spoke about the Domestic Loft Insulation scheme which has been re-started by ESC, and the Waveney flood barrier scheme which has had to be halted due to the cost quadrupling. He commented that this would have led to benefits all the way down the coast. CH updated CIIrs on the recent Community Partnership Meeting at which money was allocated to a new SID for the SAVID group of Councils, and Martlesham Recreation Ground

Flooding - CH suggested that the PC invites the Flood Resilience officer from the SCC Joint Emergency Planning Unit to speak at the Annual Parish Meeting on 7th May. He also said that planning approval has been given for a reservoir to be built at Culpho for Lord Cranworth's purposes and he expressed concern about the provisions in the event of a "failure" or a repetition of Storm Babet. He has reported his concerns to the ESC Planning Department. John Carter-Jonas (JCJ) suggested that a river gauge be purchased for the River Lark. This will be discussed at the APM.

ENFORCEMENT MATTERS

ENF/22/0069/USE _ Lower Street Following the recent flooding, concerns had been raised about contamination of the land. The ESC Enforcement Officer has another site visit made and concluded that the situation remains unchanged, and any leakage of harmful waste is outside the jurisdiction of ESC. Cllrs will continue to monitor the site and if deemed necessary, will contact the Environment Agency.

REVIEW OF NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Sue Prentice (SP) reported no further progress with this.

REPORT FROM ESPA CONFERENCE

SP said that it is apparent that the new regulations regarding Planning and Environment are understood by a very small number of people. Consideration is being given to creating a fund in order to get further advice on the Environment Act 2023 and its effect on PCs.

ESC NEW PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBER CALL-IN PROCESS

Details of the new scheme have been circulated and there were no comments on this.

VACANCY FOR PARISH COUNCILLOR

Sally Johnson has resigned as a Parish Councillor. SP wished to place on record the Council's thanks to Sally for her long service as a Cllr for over 20 years. The Clerk confirmed that ESC has issued the vacancy notices which are on the Notice Boards with a closing date of 4th April.

SOCIAL MEDIA COMMUNICATION

Caroline Saunders (CS) explained the WhatsApp Broadcast Channel and suggested this would be a better way to communicate emergency matters such as flooding etc. on an "information only" basis. Trevor Harris is also familiar with this and will discuss it with CS and they will report to the next meeting.

HIGHWAYS AND FOOTPATHS

Speedwatch – CH reported that two people have recently withdrawn from this, leaving only two whereas four are required. They are needed one week a month for one hour every morning from Monday-Friday. A notice will be put in FLN, the Newsletter and on Facebook.

Laptop for SID – JCJ gave details of the laptop he is thinking of purchasing which would cost approx. £460.The remaining amount from the grant is £380 and it was agreed the PC would finance the balance.

Right-hand bend sign – It was agreed that JCJ could go ahead and purchase this at an approximate cost of $\pounds 65$.

Footpaths – the responsibility for the footpath in front of Cherry Tree Cottage was discussed.

ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

Trees – JCJ reported that all the trees have now been collected and contributions promised to the Village Hall Fund. He still has a number of spare tree guards available to donate in return for contributions as before.

Water sampling equipment – SP said that sampling is still continuing and requested approval for the PC to finance the next set of necessary water sampling equipment at a cost of £156.26. This was agreed. RS had some comments on this matter and SP asked him to provide a concise report for the APM.

Village Fete 2024 - SP had circulated an email to all persons who have expressed their willingness to be involved in the Fete. This has included a draft timetable of activities. She confirmed that Great Bealings will host the event for insurance purposes and have allocated some funds to underwrite the initial costs. Little Bealings has also agreed to contribute. Some volunteers have been secured but more are needed.

FINANCE AND ADMIN

Ten payments were authorised for office expenses, the Clerk's salary and PAYE, web hosting, Village Hall hire, laptop, water sampling equipment and a road sign. The Bank Reconciliation was approved for signature.

Bank signatory – Trevor Harris was appointed to take this on to replace Sally Johnson.

BEE CAFE PLANTER

a letter has been received from a resident who is asking for a contribution for a Bee Café to be placed on the verge outside the Village Hall. It was decided to leave the Village Hall to take a decision on this, as insurance would be a problem.

Arrangements for Annual Meetings on 7^{th} May

The Annual Parish Meeting will commence at 7.00 p.m. in the Village Hall, followed by refreshments. The Annual Parish Council Meeting will follow afterwards.

DATE OF JULY MEETING

This will now take place on Tuesday 9th July instead of 23rd.

The public are welcome to attend any Parish Council meeting and may speak for a maximum of 3 minutes on any item on the agenda in the Public Participation session. Full draft and approved minutes of the Parish Council are available on the Council's website. The agenda is published approx. a week in advance of a meeting.

What is a Parish Council and why become a Parish Councillor?

A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish and has an overall responsibility for the well-being of its local community. It is the level government closest to the community, with the district authority above it in the hierarchy. As it is the authority closest to the people, it is a vital part of any community.

What does it do?

It represents the local community, for example, as a statutory consultee in responding to planning applications.

It strives to improve quality of life in the parish by promoting issues that residents tell us are important, such as negotiating with the County Council and the Police to achieve reduced speed limits through the It is also works in partnership village. with neighbouring towns and parishes, contributing to collective decisions of benefit to the parish and the wider community. Notable in this regard was the introduction of Quiet Lanes. It also contributes to the work being done to improve water quality in the River Deben and its tributaries

Why become a Parish Councillor?

PARISH How much time does it take up?



WORD FROM THE STUDY

A happy and peaceful Easter to you all from all our Churches. People look forward to this time of year as a sign of better weather, or at least dryer weather after the winter we have had or even longer days. PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of the Playford Parish Council meeting held 6th March 2024. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: *www.playford.org.uk*

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The Co. Cllr's written report is appended to the full minutes on the PC website.

Co Cllr Elaine Bryce further stated there's been an 82% increase in reported potholes and problems with local roads and to contact her if anything urgent was needed which she could help with. Vast number of floods this year has resulted in Highways crews being increased by 70% to cope with this. A "Dragon Patcher" which runs on bio-fuel is being trialled on road repairs. County Council's budget has been approved, 77% of which is taken up by housing, education, children, elderly and vulnerable adults and social care, leaving very little for other concerns.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

These reports are appended to the full

minutes on the PC website. District Cllr Colin Hedgley further reported the Council Tax increase for this year was confirmed at 2.98%, that tourist industry support will continue for another 3 years, a model council meeting had been set up at the council chambers in Melton for school children to take part in, a funding gap of £124m has forced the flood barrier scheme to close in Lowestoft and results of the East Suffolk photo competition had now been published.

As always, Colin is happy to help constituents with any problems concerning council business.

ACTION POINT REVIEW

A date for the appeal of reinstating the unregistered footpath between Butts Road and Church Road is still awaited.

Works on C324 (traffic priority and drainage) has been delayed due to extra work after recent flooding etc – traffic priority works should be carried out this year, but drainage improvements may be delayed until 2025.

Road signs to deter large vehicles from using Church Lane will be fitted this Spring.

Clearing the drainage ditch beside Butts Road in front of the parish hall will be undertaken by ESS some time after April.

Loose netting on wooden bridge in Alder Carr is to be attended to soon.

The removal of large amounts of silt HIGHWAYS deposited in Church Lane by recent flood waters has been chased up - Highways this responsibility has deferred to Operations at East Suffolk - (later: this has now been attended to).

We await clearance of the drainage ditch in Butts Road near entrance to the village hall - ESS will carry this out soon.

Fallen ivy-clad trees on the side of Butts Road near the railway bridge are fouling telephone cables - OpenReach has been alerted but will not act unless the cable has parted.

Many large linear potholes are causing concern in Butts Road - the most recent one to be reported to Highways was found not to have reached their intervention criteria despite being 4m long x 150mm deep - Elaine Bryce will take this up with Highways as these potholes are a danger to traffic and pedestrians.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

FINANCE

Payments were authorised for the clerk's January and February salary, stationery expenses of £63.28 and tax to HMRC. A recommended donation of £100 was paid to the team renovating the bottle bank area. Invoice of £1117.19 for grass & hedge cutting services in Playford was paid to East OTHER MATTERS Suffolk Services, £42.83 was paid to CAS for web hosting and £35.99 paid for domain name registration of the parish website. The budget for 2023-24 is on track and the bank reconciliation was agreed. Quarterly interest of £38.74 was received on the reserve account. Budget for 2024-25 was discussed. Assessment, Financial Risks. Parish Safe-guarding Standing Orders and policies were reviewed.

Work on the drainage and traffic priority improvements on the C324 has been put back by recent bad weather, (details above). New signage to deter heavy traffic in Church Lane should be installed soon. The SIDs report was circulated showing data for February, average recorded speeds were 32.5 mph. SIDs device will be back in Plavford in April and SAVID is applying for another device at their next meeting on 18th April 2024.

PLANNING APPLICATION

DC/24/0503/FUL - Cherrybanks, Church Plans for a single storev rear Lane. extension with alterations to the roof, enlargement of windows and changing the building facade to timber and brick cladding.

The parish council approved these plans which will now be decided by East Suffolk planners.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The draft Neighbourhood Plan was finally submitted to the independent Examiner who has given his final report. Ian Poole, our consultant will make the amendments before preparing the Plan for the Referendum which is scheduled to take place on 13th June this year.

Progress on Playford's Emergency Plan is ongoing and will be discussed further at the next PC meeting.

Boules Piste repairs are on hold until May.

The assembling and installation of Risk Bee Cafés to promote pollination and to link up with others in nearby parishes to form a Bee corridor is planned - children are being asked to help with this project on Good Friday (29th March) at a session DATE OF NEXT MEETING in the Village Hall and a finished unit will be placed on the plaving field at the rear of the car park.
