PLEASE CAN YOU HELP?

PUBLIC INQUIRY INTO FP BUTTS RD TO CHURCH RD, PLAYFORD 12-13 NOVEMBER 2024

In 2016 Playford Parish Council applied to have the footpath between Butts Road and Church Road reinstated.

In December 2022 the SCC Development and Regulation Committee considered the formal application and decided to accept it and a Modification Order was made. However, the landowner objected to the decision and the whole case was passed to the Planning Inspectorate in Bristol.

The Planning Inspectorate inquiry is scheduled to be held at 10.00 a.m. on Tuesday 12 November 2024, at the Elisabeth Frink Room, Suffolk County Council, Endeavour House, 8 Russell Road, Ipswich, Suffolk, IP1 2BX. The appointed Inspector will also open the Inquiry as a virtual event on Tuesday 12 November 2024 at 10.00 a.m.

At the initial hearing at SCC a number of people submitted evidence of having used the said footpath, but we are hoping that other walkers, dog walkers or hikers who remember using the footpath might come forward to add strength to our numbers. Do you remember using the footpath to get home to Branson's or Culpho from Bealings school

The footpath is a vital link when walking between our villages and giving as much evidence to the planning inspectorate as possible is really important.

If you do remember using the footpath and can either give evidence in person, via a link or just by email or letter, please contact me for further information.

FOXGLOVES

This item would have dated badly if we had held it over until September, so we take this opportunity to show this great picture of foxgloves, supplied by Maureen Midwinter.



The picture was taken in her meadow which nicely straddles the border with Little Bealings, across the river from Great Bealings. This has been a good year for foxgloves. They seem to have liked the damp weather, and some have been growing really tall, above standard human height. Thank you, Maureen. The meadow is in good hands.

The plant is also known as Digitalis, deriving from the Latin word for "finger". Foxgloves are biennials. They grow wild, but gardeners like to import them., and try to tame them. They are usually a purplish colour, but can be white. The term digitalis is also for used drua preparations. Foxgloves have medicinal uses but are also very toxic to humans and other animals. Consumption can even lead to death.

The German name for the plant is *Fingerhut*, literally *'finger hat'*, or *'thimble'*. A colourful thought, even if you're not really into languages. Wikipedia suggests

that the English name may have suggested that foxes wore the flowers on their paws to silence their movements as they stealthily hunted their prey.

Whatever the etymology of the name, these flowers have a special beauty, and they are growing with particular vigour this rather damp year.

- THE GREAT BRITISH SUMMER HOLIDAY

The great British Summer holiday has evolved. The arrival of the railways in Victorian times, while primarily facilitating the transportation of heavy goods, also opened up the best of our seaside resorts to holiday travellers, with piers, such as those at Felixstowe, Aldeburgh and Clacton, with their newly built grand hotels. It was not until 1938 that statutory paid holiday leave became an entitlement for British workers. That is something we now take for granted. By statute we are now entitled to 5.6 weeks paid leave a year. Holidaying has become a mass industry.

I wish we could report on a wider range - ST MARY'S, WOODBRIDGE of positive news items, but, sadly, we can't. There is good news on the Digital Donation-collecting apparatus - it has been acquired, thanks to the sustained efforts of new PCC Secretary, Bridget Tanno, but it has yet to be installed skilled operative needed.

Similarly, our lovely new wooden gate for the North wall is still awaiting the assembling of a small able-bodied workforce to put it in place. Please answer the call if it comes your way. 

- CHURCHWARDENS' UPDATE CHURCH CAFÉ

We re-opened on 10 April and our lovely volunteers have welcomed customers each Wednesday for our full lunchtime service and on Saturday mornings for drinks and cake. We have received increasingly positive feedback as we have grown and expanded what we offer. We are becoming increasingly busy, and this is generating much needed income to cover the costs of running the church building as well as providing a service of value to the community. We are constrained as to how many sessions we can run given the need to operate a sustainable service with sufficient volunteers who are not overburdened, as well as by practical constraints associated with drainage limitations. Importantly we need to align opening with actual demand to be economically viable.

We are grateful to all those who support the cafe and also look forward to welcoming new customers.

EVENTS HELD IN OUR HUB SPACE

If you're looking for a flexible space to hire for an event, you might like to consider All Saints Church. The church opens up as a hub for multiple uses, kindly sponsored bγ multiple organisations and individuals through grants and donations. The interior is equipped with Wi-Fi, a large screen multimedia system with projector, central heating, very comfortable seating, and a cosy log stove. The large screen simply disappears when you don't need it, and appears at the touch of a button when you do! Our new kitchen installation was completed in 2023, the interior space has been fully repainted and looks fresh and

wonderful, and our new very-comfy chairs are in place.

On Saturday 8th June All Saint's church was hired by Syrinx Music. The church filled with choristers, accompanied by their pianist. Pieces performed were by Franz Schubert, John Corigliano, Bob Dylan and many other classical composers. The performances. and both vocal instrumental were captivating, and the harmonies mesmerising; the acoustics enhanced the music filling the air with the pureness of the choir's voices. OTHER UPDATES

A quinquennial Survey of the church fabric is planned for June which will clearly identify any areas not tackled since previous survey in 2017 and which no doubt will give the PCC additional concerns.

A recent burial was attended by over 80 mourners, which could all be comfortably accommodated thanks to loan of additional seating from the Angela Cobbold Hall.

We have become aware of the access problems caused by those attending large events at the church and parking in the street such that emergency vehicles could not easily pass. This is a matter that will require attention at future events.

We are looking with our local minister, Gary Jones, at options that could enable the church to open for additional church related activities in the week, for example relevant for pupils attending the school, but for this we will need to find volunteers and gauge demand. The unfortunate resignation of our incumbent Sarah

Quantrill led to the benefice holding an 'away day' on Saturday 15th June to consider how best to move forward in order to provide the ministry required by our villages alongside the township of Kesgrave. All Saints has benefitted from having the resources of this benefice and has continued to maintain two services per month along with Wednesday morning prayers.

We hope the growing diverse uses of the church building continue and we look forward to continuing to move forward in a harmonious way with all in our beautiful village enjoying and growing the limited facilities that we have available.
