That is why a group has been formed to look at the feasibility of providing all those facilities within a flexible space at Little Bealings Church. You are most welcome to join us. You would also be most welcome to join us at any of the Parochial Church Councils. I promise that the meetings will be exhilarating not exhausting!

ST MARY'S

Undaunted by all the headlines about Brexit, bombs in Brussels and all the budget controversies, spring has quietly slipped back into the picture. There are signs of green in the hedges. The sights and sounds that are characteristic of outdoor country life are stirring hearts and senses again. We hope you have the time and inclination to be open to them, and to appreciate them. Village life goes on, marked by the change of the seasons, and all those signs of change which those of us living in villages can so readily identify. Alongside the seasons, other things change too. Residents move on, new residents join us. It is a gradual but unending evolution. But that's life. New problems, new challenges, new hopes, new aspirations. Let's enjoy everything that spring symbolises.

LOOKING BACK

At our PCC meeting on March 2nd the implications of the findings of the 2015 Quinquennial were discussed. It will clearly be a challenge to source the nec-

essary funds for roof repairs, but, on a more accessible level, there are a number of tasks which could be undertaken by people living within the village. If we can channel local resources and talents, we could not only have a community work day, on the lines of our churchyard working party, but also save significant sums of money. Tasks might include the digging of a soakaway, the repairing of a fence, various painting tasks, plus clearing of gutters and gulleys. There is also some pointing to be done. We will be recruiting shortly, after identifying a suitable date.

LOOKING AHEAD ANNUAL MEETING

At our PCC meeting on Tuesday March 2nd the Annual Report was broadly approved and will be presented at our Annual Meeting which will take place after the 10.00 service on **Sunday April 3rd**. Refreshments will be served as normal immediately after the service, so if you cannot make the service but would like to attend the meeting please join us for refreshments just before 11.00am.

It is at the Annual Meeting that elections are held for officers and membership of the PCC for the year to come. Your support is invited. Not only that, but evidence of that support is the best incentive for members of your PCC to carry on caring for the church and for its role in this community.

CHURCHYARD

There are a number of tasks identified in the 2015 Quinquennial Report which relate to the churchyard. The fences and walls need a bit of attention, while the toilet/store block also needs renewed weather-proofing. These tasks will be included in the list mentioned above. We do consider that our churchyard is, in a different way, as conducive to peace and contemplation as is the interior of the church and will do our best to maintain it to that end. The setting of our church amidst the fields and water meadows, close to the river, and surrounded by wildlife, makes it very special. It must be kept that way.

Lantern: We have received a quotation for the cost of significant repairs to the lantern over the church gate. It is one of the special features, and clearly needs to be repaired before we have our spate of summer weddings. We will discuss funding of the repair within the PCC – but contributions welcome!

FRIENDS OF GREAT BEALINGS CHURCH

What now for the Friends of Great Bealings Church?

The Friends were set up in July 2011 with the twin aims of bringing together members of the village and their families by arranging events which people would enjoy and which would also achieve the second aim of raising funds for the fabric of St Mary's Church, to ensure its future as a building central to the village. Since its creation, there have been a number of highs - the Farm Fayre, concerts, cricket matches, the dinner at Seckford Hall and the creation of the nature group, all of which have helped us, collectively, to cope with the lows, notably the damage to the structure and need for considerable remedial work identified in the 2010 quinquennial review. The completion of the remedial works to the structure of the building and the internal plaster work, last year was a major achievement and it would be tempting to think that our work is now done. But (unfortunately, there is a but) we have now had the report from the 2015 quinquennial review which has identified even more work that need to be done; this time to the roof. So the need for the Friends is as great as ever, because even though we cannot hope, by fundraising alone, to raise the significant sums that we need, our fundraising does assist us when we are applying for grants. The support of the village and the evidence that we are making a conscious effort to protect the church is always taken into account when funding decisions are made.

Membership of the Friends is open to anyone who is interested (for whatever reason) in preserving our beautiful and historic church. Many of our members are not regular church goers; some would not even describe themselves as having any faith; but we all share a desire to protect the building from the ravages of

time so that it can continue to be used for services, celebrations and quiet reflection. We are planning to have an open afternoon to which everyone is invited to find out a bit about the building and its history and enjoy afternoon tea (with the option of something stronger). It will also give people the opportunity to suggest fund-raising events. The date will be announced in the next edition of the Newsletter and via the Bealings and Playford News. REPORTS

Colin Hedgley reported on the following matters:

Melton Hill Development, SCDC Budget for 2016/17, possible merger of SCDC and WDC, Customer Service improvements at Woodbridge Library, Queen's 90th Birthday celebrations. A full copy of his report is attached to the minutes.

Colin Hedgley reported on the recent informal meeting with PC Karen Clabburn

PLANNING

DC/16/0270/FUL – Creation of new outbuilding adjacent to, and to match the new dwelling's garage – Meadow Cottage, Lodge Road, Great Bealings

A letter was sent to SCDC making no objection but imposing a condition (letter attached to the minutes). SCDC subsequently referred this condition back to the PC, and after consultation with the District Councillor, the condition was withdrawn.

DC/16/0094/FUL – Conversion of outbuilding to annexe living accommodation – Croft House, Lower Street, Gt. Bealings

It was **RESOLVED** that the PC supports this application, with a note added that we would strongly object to any future application for the annexe to become a separate dwelling to the main house.

DC/16/0499/FUL – Proposed garage, poly-tunnel, pond, swimming pool, gates, walls and fences – Fynn Bridge Barn, Little Bealings

It was **RESOLVED** that there are no objections to this application

Report on Wood Barn meeting with SCDC

Charles Barrington reported that a useful meeting had taken place with SCDC. An earlier scheme that had been refused permission, has now been appealed

Meadow Cottage – Diversion of footpath

Following an invitation for residents to comment on the proposed diversion, some responses have been received which were discussed. In view of these it was agreed that the client's representative would be informed that there are some objections.

HIGHWAYS

There are some large pot-holes in Lodge Road. John Carter-Jonas will report these on SCC's web-link

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The final draft and the consultation document has been circulated to all Councillors and following Charles Barrington's recommendation, it was **RESOLVED** that the Plan is formally endorsed and should be submitted to SCDC. The next steps are for an independent examiner to be appointed then SCDC has to send it out for statutory consultation, which will be followed by a referendum in the village.

QUIET LANES

The following have been suggested for inclusion in the scheme: Part of Seckford Hall Lane, Hasketon Road, Grundisburgh Road, Kiln Lane and Rosery Lane. The PC now has to publicise the fact that it is intended to put these forward. A notice will be circulated stating that these will be discussed on 16th May at the Annual Parish Meeting.

BENEFICE MAGAZINE

The Benefice Magazine is running at a loss and a meeting has been arranged for 31st March for this to be discussed by all interested parties. It was suggested that a change of title may make it more appealing to advertisers.

EMERGENCY PLAN

As a result of an appeal, several offers of assistance have been received, including from a national Rapid Response Organisation who have local contacts. Anthony Sheppard has met with them and will arrange another meeting to be held that can be reported to the Annual Parish Meeting.

COMMUNITY ASSET

Charles Barrington informed the PC that SCDC have advised that the meadow cannot be registered as a Community Asset. The land has now been sold and the new owner wants to put a container on the site. Sally Johnson will speak with him to find out more about his intentions for the site.

FINANCE

Seven cheques were authorised, relating to the Neighbourhood Plan expenses, Clerk's salary and PAYE and hall hire


due to an overwhelming late demand for grants, our application has been unsuccessful. An alternative funding scheme will be available in April and the Clerk has registered to be notified.

LITTLE BEALINGS ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in Bealings Village Hall on 14 March, chaired by the Parish Council Chairman, Margaret Wilson. Apologies were received from the Reverend Celia Cook and Parish Councillor Barnaby Rufford. Mrs Wilson welcomed residents and thanked the Clerk and Mr George Ball, especially as Mr Ball was retiring from his role maintaining the footpaths in the village. The work will be carried out this year by a contractor, Tony Fear. The Chairman also thanked Mrs Jenny Cook, who was also standing down after many years as Tree and Footpath Warden. She thanked the Council's webmaster, Jenny Shaw, for her work and District Councillor Colin Hedgley and County Councillor Peter Bellfield for their advice and support during the year.

There had been nine Parish Council meetings over the last year, and the planning applications commented on included house extensions, a replacement dwelling and development proposals at Sinks Pit. Anglian Water had rejected the Council's application for the connection of a part of The Street to the mains sewer, but the decision had

been appealed. The Council had achieved agreement to a 20mph speed limit for part of The Street, but it had been delayed due to a funding shortfall. It was intended that this would be resolved during 2016.

The Council had joined SAVID (Safer Village Driving) and continued its membership of the Suffolk Association of Local Councils, Community Action Suffolk and the Suffolk Preservation Society.

There were also reports from Margaret Wilson on behalf of Bealings Village Hall, Vicki Carr about the Angela Cobbold Hall and a written report from Celia Cook on behalf of the PCC.

Residents asked questions about the Angela Cobbold Hall and the funding for the 20mph speed limit.

Mrs Wilson thanked all those who attended the meeting. It was followed by an introduction to the purpose of a Village Review and what it could achieve, given by Gillian Benjamin from Community Action Suffolk.

Parish Council Meeting held on 16 March 2016

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

DC/16/0499/FUL: Proposed garage, polytunnel, pond, swimming pool, gates, walls and fences at Fynn Bridge Barn, The Street

There was no objection to the application.

DC/15/5055/FUL: Change of use in Kesgrave Quarry from mineral use to associated parking and access routes for adjacent Trucks R Us headquarters

This application had been approved by SCDC.

EAOW3

This application, for up to 172 offshore wind turbine generators and associated infrastructure, had been accepted by the Planning Inspectorate. The cabling was

proposed to be installed along ducts to be laid during the works for EAOW1. It was agreed to repeat the Council's previous objections to the development on the grounds of disruption to the community, including requesting community compensation, and to express concern that the change from HVDC to HVAC current made the project less safe for residents.

HIGHWAYS

20mph Speed Limit in The Street

It was anticipated that an increase to the funding previously allocated by the three local District Councillors, and a further contribution from County Councillor Peter Bellfield's Local Highways Budget during 2016, would enable the design to be prepared.

Footpaths

SCC had advised that it had dealt with a fallen tree on Footpath 11.

Exposed Kerbstone in The Street

It was noted that, after being reminded of their commitment to remove the kerbstone when resurfacing works were being done, SCC had relocated it to a new position on the edge of the road.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor Colin Hedgley's report included an update on progress on the new SCDC headquarters at Melton, the sale of the existing site and improvements to Woodbridge Library to provide new Customer Services for SCDC.

POLICE

No report had been received but Mr Hedgley advised that, although there were fewer officers available, they did still intend to attend Parish Council meetings when possible.

FINANCE

The Council adopted revised Standing Orders and Financial Regulations following an amendment to public contracts regulations.

Income had been received from Gt Bealings Parish Council (for its share of Councillor training and the

insurance premium for the shared wooden village sign) and from NSI (annual interest on the Savings Account).

Cheques were signed for the annual Data Protection Registration fee, the Clerk's salary and for PAYE for March and for hire of the Village Hall/

Committee Room for meetings during 2015/16.

It was resolved to appoint Jonathan Fieldsend as the Council's internal auditor.

PLAYFORD PARISH COUNCIL

These are condensed notes of the proceedings of Playford Parish Council meeting held 2nd March 2016. A full version of the minutes appears on the website: www.playford.org.uk

ACTION POINT REVIEW

The condition of Byway19 is reasonable, following the latest repair, but 4x4 vehicles continue to use this track at night - this is difficult to monitor.

Verges at lower end of Hill Farm Road have been trimmed back by Suffolk Coastal Norse Ltd and Clarke & Simpson have been approached to clear the adjacent ditches.

We await the return of further evidence forms before applying to reinstate the unregistered footpath between C330 & U3311.

The temporary repair to broken tarmac at the junction of Butts Road & Brook Lane, has still not been permanently fixed but the clerk has been told that works have been ordered to rectify this.

The visibility at the splay on the junction of C324 & Church Road has now been re-assessed by Highways dept. and not deemed to be a problem. Photos to be sent to the East Area Highways manager to contest this decision.

Overgrown vegetation affecting FP's 9 & 13 –this task is with the contractors. Overhanging brambles are beginning to be a problem on the C324 again, clerk to write to landowner.

See Action log appended to the Minutes on the website for more details of these items.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County Councillor, Peter Bellfield was unable to attend due to illness.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District Councillor, Robert Whiting reported that there is still a freeze on core council tax but the nationally applied levy on social care will mean an increase of 2% overall, £5.4m has been allocated to adult social care. There will be a 1.99% increase on band D council tax for 2016-17 and £8m will be needed to cover increased costs due to the new Living Wage being introduced on 1st April 2016. A 25 week refurbishment project has been started at Ipswich Railway Station. Grant money is to be made available from the County Council Locality Budget to fund a joint Community Speedwatch project with Rushmere St Andrew PC. Planning application for 215 houses at Martlesham has been refused and the application for 300 houses in the Bell Lane area of Kesgrave has been deferred. Developers are now working on plans for 1000 new houses at Kesgrave – this will require major changes to the infrastructure.

TALK ON COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH PROJECT BY JAMES WRIGHT OF RUSHMERE ST ANDREW

The main aim of this venture is to educate drivers into safer practices. A Speeder radar gun will be used to detect cars travelling at over 30mph. Offenders will be sent warning letters and the Police may take action over repetitive offenders. Volunteers are being sought to work in conjunction with those from Rushmere St Andrew PC – they will undergo Police training and will work in teams of three, having been issued with suitable safety

equipment. Playford PC voted unanimously in favour of the project going ahead and proposed locations will be approved by the Police to carry out this work. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer should contact James Wright on 07494 447391.

FINANCE

Payments have been authorised for the clerk's expenses and for reimbursement of the purchase of computer equipment (the grant application to NALC has now been approved for this). Suffolk Coastal Norse Ltd has not yet invoiced the Parish Council for grass maintenance carried out last year – this will be allowed for in the budget for next year.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Two meetings to discuss the merits of adopting a Neighbourhood Plan have been held and considerable interest has been generated. It was resolved to take this to the next level and to register Playford's interest with SCDC and to invite Chief Planning Officer Hilary Hanslip to visit Playford to give a talk.

QUEEN'S 90th BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

This event is now being organised by the Village Hall Committee.

OTHER MATTERS

The Outdoor Playspace project for installing the basketball post and net will be underway shortly and it is hoped to commence work on the ground surface very soon.

A new litter bin has been installed in the village Hall car park.

Parking issues in Church Lane appear to have been resolved.

The WI has taken over the organisation of the Village Litter Pick for this year.

There is still a vacancy for another Parish Councillor, please contact the Clerk if you are interested in this.

PLANNING

It is hoped that the site meeting with SCC Highways Dept. to resolve planning issues arising with Airys Cottage and Sonnet House will be rescheduled soon, the previous meeting having been postponed.

DATE OF NEXT MEETING

SPEEDWATCH

At the last Playford Parish Council meeting, James Wright, from Rushmere Parish Council invited us to join in a joint community speed watch venture. It was unanimously agreed by Playford Parish Council to go ahead providing Sgt Cullum approved of the two observation points which we had identified on Butts Road through the village.

We have just heard that he has approved the sites and we are now looking for volunteers to man the radar gun.

Volunteers will require a short session of training and it is envisaged that Playford volunteers could man the Rushmere sites and Rushmere volunteers the Playford sites.
