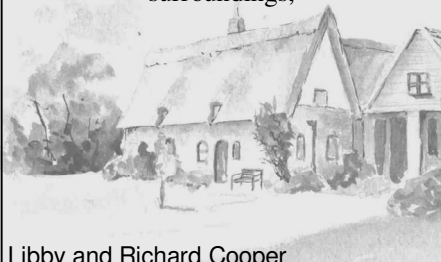

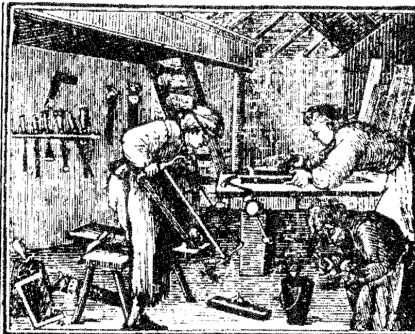

Pontius Pilate may have had something after all when he washed his hands after condemning Jesus to die. Scientists at the University of Michigan have evidence to suggest that the physical act of hand washing can wipe away doubt and put the mind at rest after making a difficult decision. Shakespeare also explored this idea with his character Lady Macbeth after she has been involved in murder.

A study was set up in Michigan whereby a group of volunteers who thought that they were taking part in a consumer survey of CD's were asked to browse 30 CD covers. They were then asked to pick the 10 CD's that they would like to own and rank them by preference. The reward for doing this was the gift of either their fifth or sixth ranking CD to keep. Half of the participants then washed their hands. Researchers reported that those who washed their hands were happier with their decision than those who did not. The study was repeated using anti-septic wipes with the same result. It seems that washing your hands after making a difficult decision can

remove the doubts about whether you have done the right thing and removes the need for continual thought about whether the decision was the correct one. The results suggest that the psychological impact of physical cleansing extends beyond the normal boundaries, as it seems to remove the worry of past decisions and provides a new start.

The church also uses this symbol of washing to give a new start, during the service of Baptism. After promises have been made on behalf of or by the candidate, if old enough, to resist evil and follow Jesus Christ. Water is poured over the head. It is a symbolic washing away of all that is not of Christ, so that the candidate can begin a new life with Christ. Some baptisms take place where the candidates can be totally immersed in water, a very visual dying to the old life and rising to new life in Christ. Baptism also calls for God's Spirit, the Holy Spirit, to be with the newly baptised person. The Holy Spirit is God's breath in us giving us energy and life and power to live like Jesus.

PLANT SALE SATURDAY 24th – RECORD TAKINGS

Our sincere thanks to all those people who helped us to bring in a record sum of £2621 (before minor expenses), for the shared benefit of our two village churches, both of which remain so very much in need of funds. This really was a wonderful day, blessed with good spring weather, and with buyers attracted in from far and wide, thereby ensuring that not all the money came out of Bealings pockets. Let's hope that plants which are grown in local gardens by our splendid team of volunteer amateur plant producers transplant happily to other types of soil, and bring our customers back again next year in even greater numbers.

It is difficult to believe that we managed to produce such an excellent array of plants after such a harsh and seemingly interminable winter. But produce them we, did, and the sale of those plants, together with a successful raffle, a well stocked produce stall and refreshments carried us through to that record total –an amazing result for just two hours selling. Of course that is not the whole story. The production of the plants takes hours of unseen labour. The setting up of the Village Hall (and, indeed, the clearing away) needs the services and enthusiasm of our team of well-drilled, willing volunteers, and those who take part say that that is part of the fun, and a great way of getting to know other people in the villages. Certainly the pub lunch after the event is always a happy occasion –particularly so this year as people sensed that we had done well, even before all the takings had been counted. So –if you would like to play a part next year and would like to offer your services in some capacity, do please let us know. Most of us have learnt on the job, and we need to ensure continuity. Equally, for next year, we do keep wondering if there are ways in which we might creatively and productively extend what we do. Maybe we could organise a few games/money-raising stalls at the back of the Hall, without diluting the plant-buying impetus. Do please pass on your ideas.

So – our sincere thanks to all involved in another highly successful event –buyers, sellers, producers, helpers of all sorts, and supporters. Our Plant Sale is not only an event which does our villages proud, bringing in people from far afield to see them in their best light, but it also serves to bring the people of our two villages together, and that is the essence of community spirit. Did David Cameron say something about The Big Society? Perhaps this was the Big Society in action, involving people working together in their own enterprise.

The date for next year has already been selected: **April 16th** –the Saturday before Easter. Easter is obviously impossible, and, given good weather, Easter is the time when people like to get out into their gardens, so we would hate them to be short of plants. Wait a week later and all sorts of other Plant Sales are being staged. The only meeting, intended to ensure that everything is in place, takes place in the Angela Cobbold Hall on Monday **March 7th**. Do join us, and be part of it all. You will be made very welcome.

GREAT BEALINGS

LILIAN HOLT

On Friday April 30th, the funeral of Lilian May Holt, wife of Charles, took place at St Mary's. Lilian was born in London on 31/12/1911 and grew up there with her parents and three sisters. After school, she trained at a top fashion house in London as a cutter and rapidly became a very skilled tailor & cutter, who worked on dresses for the top models and fashion shows of the time. She met Charles Holt in the early 1930's and they married in 1935. Maureen (now Midwinter) was born in 1938 and Roger in 1944. During the war years, they lived in Bromley near to where Charles was involved in military vehicle design albeit with a short spell in the country in 1944 to avoid the worst of the Doodlebugs. After the war, they moved to Newbury where the children grew up and Maureen met John. When Maureen and her family returned from the USA in 1971 to Suffolk, Lilian and Charles also moved there and subsequently to Great Bealings.

For many years, Lilian had worked with the WVS and was much involved in collecting and dispatching relief supplies after the East Coast Floods in 1953. In Suffolk she delivered "Meals on Wheels" with Margaret Keer, often taking Jonathan along as well when he was very small. Her early years in the fashion industry gave her an acute colour sense and a deep awareness of clothes design and finish. This stayed with her for life and was always apparent in her own dressing as, well as in her skill and attention to detail in other things such as flower arranging. Lilian was a dedicated mother and also was much loved by her six grandchildren and five great grandchildren. Their very warm memories of her were reflected in their own contribution to the service. Lilian and Charles moved to a flat in

Wickham Market about 20 years ago and then, some years after Charles had died, Lilian moved to Highlands residential home in Woodbridge where she died in her sleep on Easter Sunday. Charles and Lilian are now lying together again in our churchyard.

LOOKING BACK – AND FORWARD

On April 30th we had the funeral of Lilian Holt, mother of Maureen Midwinter and widow of the late Charles Holt, a former churchwarden of St Mary's. During their time in Great Bealings the Holts lived in the bungalow on the Grundisburgh Road, currently the home of Dorothy and Ken Yule. We heard how Lilian, a highly talented needlewoman, had worked in Regent Street for dressmakers to the royal court and how she had made beautiful gowns for debutantes—her creative enthusiasms were passed on down through to her family. After the move to Suffolk she worked for the WVS in the aftermath of the 1950s floods and was involved with Meals on Wheels and flower arranging. She had reached the grand age of 98 and had spent her final years in Highlands nursing home, but always maintained her strong religious faith and a great affection for Great Bealings. Norman Porter, your churchwarden has been duly sworn in for another year in office at a service in Aldeburgh on May 4th. The combined Deaneries of Woodbridge

and Saxmundham packed out the church, as the assembled churchwardens were addressed by our new Archdeacon, Ven Dr Judy Hunt. It is good to know that Freddie Sledmere is now back at home having had his 27 year-old hip replacement replaced. We wish him a speedy convalescence.

HISTORIC CHURCHES CYCLE RIDE

This year's cycle ride is scheduled to take place on **Saturday September 11th**. This really is a stimulating and challenging day out, so please make a note now in your diaries, and let's see if we can tempt more Bealings riders out on to the roads than we managed last year. All necessary material will be available from Norman Porter in due course.

THE ORGAN

We have pre-booked a major over-haul for the organ. This will take place after Easter 2011. Last year's concerts raised significant sums for the Organ Fund, so we shall endeavour to promote similar concerts this year to the same end. If anyone has contacts which could be primed to provide artistes for such occasions do please let us know.

CHURCHYARD

There is not much new to report apart from warning visitors that the path round behind the tower will remain blocked off for another two or three months. Stone masons have inspected the damage related to falling masonry, and consider that the damage is of a "random" variety, and that checks (with a broomstick handle!) can be made to test as to whether the frost has loosened any other stonework. The estimate for scaffolding alone to repair just one or two stones is of the order of £7000/£8000, expenditure which cannot be justified in the present climate –if at all! So we will test and wait for a few more weeks and trust that no further masonry falls will occur.

A COMMUNITY COMMERCIAL

This may not seem to be the appropriate place to flag up a commercial opera-

tion but readers may be interested to know that "The Village Grocer" –a some-time ambulance converted into a mobile grocer's shop will be visiting the village on Tuesday mornings, probably 10-00 – 11-00. (See advert). We think this justifies a mention as the closing of the village shop sent people, particularly elderly people, travelling further than they might wish in search of provisions. Better environmentally, perhaps, that one van comes to us rather than a couple of dozen people getting into individual cars to hunt down supplies. The van is well stocked. This seems like a welcome community opportunity, hence the mention in this, the churchwarden's column

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Great Bealings Annual Parish Meeting held on 11 May 2010 at the Angela Cobbold Hall.

We had a very well attended meeting (approx 40 – 50 residents) with a presentation by Mr Luke Barber, a road safety engineer from Suffolk County Council. His presentation generated a lot of questions and lasted a good 1 ½ hours. The outcome of the presentation was that the residents of Boot Street voted unanimously for the introduction of traffic calming measure in that part of Great Bealings. There was clear support for "humps and bumps" but the exact measures will be determined by the available budget for the re-surfacing scheme which will be implemented at Boot Street between the 14th June and 2nd July. Since the meeting the County

Council have been asked to produce a set of proposals for traffic calming so that these can be discussed with local residents before work begins. One major issue highlighted by residents was the lack of footpaths as they consider Boot Street dangerous for pedestrians. In addition the residents were looking for improved pedestrian links from Boot Street to the school and to the village hall and playing field. We also had reports from the Chairman who reported that the Parish Council had had a very productive year; Mr Phil Holmes on the Parish Plan and Mrs Jenny Shaw on activities at the Village Hall and Playing Field.

The Parish Council commented to SCDC that it had reviewed this planning application and would like to support the proposal on the understanding that Mr Cripps (immediate neighbour) concerns about the rear extension be accommodated.

HIGHWAYS

The Bridleway sign on Grundisburgh Road has been re-erected.

Mr Cripps informs us that the wobbly stile (footpath 15B) has been reinforced by one of Lord Cranworth's farm workers.

FINANCE

The Annual Return and Statement of Accounts 2009/10 were approved by the Councillors and signed by the Chairman and Clerk. These had been internally audited by Mr John Stroud and would be sent to the external auditors BDO Stoy Haywood in due course. The first half of the precept for 2010/11 had been received from SCDC. Cheques were authorised for membership of SALC for 2010/11 and subscription to NALC for the coming year. Donations to CATS, SARS, The Disability Advice Service, the Benefice Newsletter, and the Bealings Village Hall Trust were also authorised.

PLAYFORD

DAVID HEARD 1931 - 2010

David’s early life was spent in Cornwall and Devon and during and after the war he lived in Exmouth where, being an avid and excellent sportsman, he played cricket for the town as did his brother Peter. Brilliant at both mathematics and physics, he was the first of his family to go to university and he went up to Southampton at the tender age of 17. He gained a doctorate in physics which was the start of a lifelong fascination with micro-electronics and semiconductor technology. In his mid twenties and fresh out of university he was twice struck down with tuberculosis but after a lengthy convalescence back in Devon he accepted a job with Philips’ at their new semiconductor and R & D operation at Mullard’s in Southampton. So began a highly successful and industry changing career which spanned more than 35 years with the company. As time progressed he held key advanced technology and senior executive roles not only in Southampton but also in Manchester, Eindhoven and finally Japan. He travelled extensively and built a

global network of colleagues and friends that he nurtured to the end. He was on ‘Tomorrow’s World’, received industry awards from the Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh. He wrote several published articles about his exploits abroad and was a comfortable and popular keynote speaker. He was passionate, always inquisitive and excited about his work and the technology that he helped bring to the world. He was one of the original semiconductor technology pioneers and championed its life-benefiting integration into the very fabric of our daily lives. It is easy to take for granted today the powerful technology that is now at our finger tips but 50 years ago this was an unfathomable dream that required the energy, vision, tenacity and leadership of people like David to make it real.

In retirement he turned his passion and energy to helping others. He consulted for Southampton University and small technology start-up companies and took great joy in his work with Cambridge University in finding project assignments for graduate students within local indus-

try. The energy that he put into all this defied his years and nothing gave him greater joy than receiving a call from a student seeking counsel and advice on a particular career decision.

He and Lilian met over dinner at the home of mutual friends. They married and spent four wonderful years living in Japan and exploring much of South East Asia. On their return they settled here in Playford where they approached life and retirement with great gusto. David took up golf again and introduced Lilian to the game and together they spent many happy hours on the golf course while over the last several years they have enjoyed the peace and tranquillity of their villa in Spain. He loved the challenge of cryptic crosswords and even, during his stay in Japan, wrote a book for beginners on how to solve them. He played a very active part in village life. His enjoyment of being an entertainer led him to be the Chieftain at the regular Burn's Night celebrations and when these changed to St George's Day he was the author of a short play that received great acclaim. He was a member of the Church Council and regular reader at Sunday services but his greatest achievement for which he will long be remembered was as chairman of the Village Hall Committee when he steered through the £283,000 Lottery funded hall refurbishment.

He was a kind, generous and loving man who always took the time to support and encourage others to reach their goals. He was always positive and believed in making the most of one's life. He had a wonderful smile and sparkle in the eye and was always there when needed.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

The Chairman/Clerk were asked to write to BT regarding the appalling state of the BT telephone box. The Clerk had received a quote of £3,000 - £6,000 to have the phone box removed from the village!

HIGHWAYS

The hand rail for the playing field will be installed in a week or two. The large oak tree on the public ROW (opposite Church Road/Bealings Road junction) is to be assessed by SCC as to whether it should be cut down (it is dead) and if it should whose responsibility it is. The Bealings Road is due to be closed for resurfacing from the 14th June through to the 2nd July during which time it is hoped that the tree to the east of the junction of Bealings Road and Church Road will be cut down/trimmed back. Also the self sown saplings will hopefully be removed from the visibility splay to the west of the junction.

The poor condition of the bank/verges on Church Road junction during the winter period was discussed at length.

The Chairman was asked to see if a repetition of this could be avoided next winter.

FINANCE

Cheques were authorised for the host domain, the internal audit, SALC subscription, the Probation Team (grass cutting) and Aon Ltd (insurance).

The Annual Return and Statement of Accounts 2010/11 were approved and adopted by the Council. These were then signed by the Chairman and Clerk and will be sent to BDO Stoy Hayward shortly.

The first instalment of the Precept has been received (£1,750).

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Mr Ted Herrington produced a "Code of Practice" for Bird Scarers. There was some concern that the bird scarers were going off from very early in the morning very loudly, every 20 or so minutes.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman produced a written report of the year's activities. This can be viewed on the web site www.playford.org.uk. His report covered the resignation of Dr David Lewis. Who has been replaced by Mr Robert Coppillie. He thanked Mr Phil Holmes and Mrs Carol Ramsden for the enormous amount of work the AMG has done. He also thanked the Parish Hall Committee for the success in helping to make the numerous functions in the Hall so successful. There have been a number of planning applications received and news that the burial site at Tuddenham was refused had been a welcome development. Finally, the Chairman reported on the village environment and

some of the problems we have had to face this year, namely: - damage to roadside kerbs, mud on the roads, failure to restore footpaths after ploughing and failure of notice of crop spraying. He thanked Councillors for their hard work over the year.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR STEVEN HUDSON'S REPORT

District Councillor Steven Hudson reported that the LDF (Local Development Framework) has taken up a lot of his time. This document has been approved by SDCDC. They have had some objections from residents of Martlesham (where the proposed developments will take place).

PARISH PLAN MR PHIL HOLMES' REPORT

If anyone would like a copy of the Parish Plan he still has a number of them at home. Mr Phil Holmes explained that the Parish Plan had been a bit different from the "norm" since three villages have been involved. Because of this, one single Parish Council has not been able to progress with it therefore an "Action Monitoring Group" has been invented. This consisted of two people from each Parish. This Group has been very successful at implementing the points brought to light from the Parish Plan consultation which happened back in April 2007. These action points were prioritised in order of importance which

also fulfilled the criteria of keeping Suffolk ACRE happy (they had funded some of the Parish Plan). They are now coming to the end of considering what can be done on the action points. Details of the action points and the specifics can be viewed on the web.

PCSO JUSTIN MOSS' REPORT

PCSO Justin Moss reported that there have been 4 crimes in the past year; a theft, a cause of harassment/alarm/distress and a burglary other building x 2. In comparison, the same period the year before saw 6 crimes recorded. PCSO Justin Moss also reported that since the NHW scheme is no longer running the signage will have to be taken down at some stage. He reported that a SID had been in the village assessing speeding in the village.

OPEN FORUM

Mrs Sally Herrington asked if the footpath that runs from Church Road through to Butts Road could be reinstated. Historically it has always been there only it seems to have been ploughed over and not used for many years.

GIVING TO ST MARY'S CHURCH - PLAYFORD

We are very grateful for the many ways in which people give to the church in this community – time, talents and money. Sometimes questions are asked about 'money' and particularly around the subject of how people can be sure about the ways in which money they give is used. The Parochial Church Council has recently reviewed its Funds and wants you to know about its decisions.

There is a '**Restricted Church Building and Churchyard Fund**'. Money given or raised over years past for the fabric of the church and churchyard and for insurance is in this Fund. Money can only go into this Fund if the donors specify that they want this donation to be used for the maintenance, insurance, or development work for the church building or the churchyard. The PCC will need this 'specification' to be in writing – either the solicitor's letter in the case of a legacy or a signed note from a 'living donor' saying what the money should be used for. Once given in this way, the money can only be used for the specified purposes. If the church building was specified, it would not be used for the churchyard and *vice versa* – but it does help the PCC to have a little flexibility ... for example, work on a tree in the churchyard that was endangering the building!

If someone was to give a donation that was specific and did not relate to either church building or churchyard – another restricted fund would need to be opened.

All other money goes into the **General Fund**, which supports the work of the church in other ways, *e.g.* in terms of its worship (including funerals, weddings and baptisms), and its pastoral care. The General Fund can also be used for the church building and churchyard. Any donations that are made without a specific usage go into the General Fund.

The PCC can decide to **designate** some of the General Fund for a special project. This is akin to 'ring-fencing' as the PCC can decide to un-designate it at any point if more important or urgent needs emerge.

Once again, we would like to thank the community and individuals for past and present generosity. If you wish to add to the value of your gift and are a UK taxpayer remember that signing a gift aid form enables the church to increase the value of your gift by 28%.
