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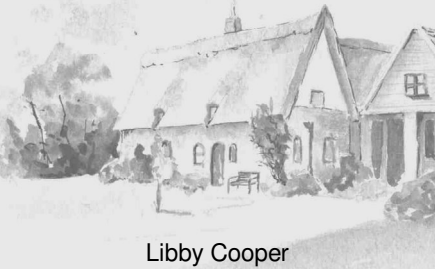

I have had a lovely summer, one of my passions as I suspect some of you are aware, is cycling, not just jumping on the bike, but also watching others, particularly road racing. Fortunately I was not too busy during the Tour de France and thoroughly enjoyed watching the Sky Team take top place and Bradley Wiggins win the competition. I was impressed by the way the Team made up of elite cyclists from different countries worked together so that one of their members stood a chance of winning. They had three top British cyclists and as the competition evolved it appeared that both Mark Cavendish, a sprinter and Chris Froome an endurance specialist put their own chances of success on hold to work with their team-mates for the good of the team. Their reward was a share in the prize money that went into the common pot. It was also good to see Wiggins showing support towards other less fortunate competitors. On the occasion of numerous punctures due to vandals who spread carpet tacks on the road, Wiggins not only led a temporary shut down of the race, but also worked to recall a wayward competitor who had taken advantage of the less fortunate to speed away. Once key rivals were again mobile the race continued with all striving for the stage win.

Hopes were high then for Team GB in the road race, but it was not to be. Sky Team mates were now deadly rivals and with the experience of the Tour de France behind

them, it became apparent that the members of several rival teams worked together so that Team GB did not have the staying power to be at the front for the sprint finish. It was a salutary reminder that joining together in a common cause can achieve more than the sum of the individual parts.

This same spirit of co-operation and well being was evident among the competitors, supporters and volunteers at the Olympic Games. It was touching to see how much applause was given to the athletes who came in last after struggling to finish their race, sometimes almost as much as that given to the winner. The wonderful spirit of the Olympics I believe was due in part to the background of our British society whose justice, welfare and culture have been shaped over the centuries by the principles of Jesus. The benefits of being nominally Christian are enormous - they have influenced a society in which vulnerable people are not left unaided, or face execution without trial when they become a political embarrassment. Much of what we enjoy in life, holidays, the beauty in architecture and music have their origins in the Christian heritage, so although the use of the hymns 'Jerusalem' and 'Abide with me' in the Opening Ceremony of the Games was a surprise, it showed that the UK refuses to shake off Christian devotion. I pray that the positive effect of the Games will have a lasting influence on our society for many months to come.

WARM AS TOAST!

Have your heating bills been sky high this year? If so, then this may help: The 'Warm as Toast' Greener Homes scheme supported by Suffolk County Council and the District/Borough Councils of Suffolk, offers FREE home insulation to residents (subject to survey and existing levels of insulation). What is more, for every home that takes up the offer, £15 will be donated to one of the schools/groups that have registered with this scheme.

By getting your home fully up to spec with cavity wall insulation and the recommended 12 inches (30cm) of loft insulation, your home can be warm as toast next winter. According to figures from the Energy Saving Trust, cavity wall insulation can typically reduce fuel bills by £135 per year, whilst loft insulation typically can reduce bills by £175. But you need to be quick, this scheme finishes on 30th September - so make sure you don't miss out!

HOME-START SUFFOLK COASTAL

There is no rule book for raising a family and sometimes it can seem overwhelming, particularly if you are going through a difficult time.

Home-Start is for families living in the Suffolk Coastal District, who have at least one child under 5 years of age. Families may need support for many reasons; coping with postnatal illness, a child's disability, family breakdown, or bereavement, or maybe feeling isolated and unable to connect with the local community. Whatever the reason Home-Start provides non-judgemental practical and emotional support and helps build confidence and ability to cope.

Our parent volunteers visit weekly for 2-3 hours. Generally we say that volunteers are not 'cooks, cleaners or babysitters', what they can do is be an extra pair of hands, or listening ears, they may accompany families to appointments, groups, or even the supermarket! But first of all they'll be a friend.

Home-Start also runs Family Groups in Leiston, Felixstowe, and Woodbridge. Family groups provide parents in need of support with a safe, stimulating environment where they feel accepted, included and encouraged to play with their children and make new friends.

Family groups are much smaller than mother & toddler groups, with up to eight families attending a session.

HISTORY OF ST MARY'S CHURCH

The new and updated History of St Mary's Church is now out and available. A special Songs of Praise service was held on August 12th, with the pulpit slot being filled for the day by the item at the head of this magazine. It was good to see so many people present, with their numbers being swelled after the service by others coming along to attend the actual book launch and to pick up their copies of the book. It was good too to welcome the designer of the book, Chris Keeble, who had come up especially

from London. The new History has been long in the preparation, but the support of so many villagers has been magnificent, with the result that it was already paid for by the time it went to print. Grateful thanks to all who offered their support –we now have a history which should serve us well for the next 20/30 years, and which leaves visitors in no doubt as to the affection in which our church is held. With the first major event being organised on Saturday September 22nd by the Friends of the Church it is fitting that we should have a publication which shows why the church deserves to have Friends.

And maybe, just maybe, we now have the incentive to make further progress towards the wider village history, possibly produced and financed on a basis similar to that of the church history. There is a wealth of material waiting to be converted into its final format.

ST MARY'S CHURCH GREAT BEALINGS

Norman Porter Churchwarden of Great Bealings and author of the new Church History and Guide gave this Address on 12th August 2012 at the morning service prior to the launch of the new History of St Mary's Church. I have asked him to include it in the Benefice News so that you can all enjoy it.

"This is not a sermon. It is however, like most sermons, rooted in a text. Not in an ancient biblical text, but a shorter more modern text recounting the History of St Mary's Church, Great Bealings. Our text covers about 1000 years, perhaps more, if we accept the theory that the lie of the terrain here suggests the presence of an ancient barrow and burial ground. It charts the development of the church which for so long has had a central place in village life.

To get you into historical mode, I would

like to try to get you to get into the hearts and minds of our forebears. Remember that for all but 150 years of the period covered by the book, the majority of the villagers spent most of their lives in and around their village. Communications were minimal. Few worked anywhere other than on the land in and around the village. There were no cars, trains, buses or tractors, just the rattle of horse-drawn carriages and farm carts. Even the bicycle was a late arrival on the scene. There were no phones, no radio, no television, just the oral grapevine and the ringing of church bells to summon and to inform. The rest of the world was very remote. Bodies, hearts and minds of ordinary folk were concentrated within the village. At its centre was the church, bringing together the gentry and the working man in a microcosm of a country which had the Christian religion at its heart. Harvest festivals and the praying for and celebration of successful crops were profoundly important for our rural community.

If you can imagine all that with eyes open, then I would like you to now shut your eyes and try to imagine some of the incidents and developments described in this book.

The final demand on the imagination of the congregation was to call to mind the tens of thousands of footfalls which had, over the centuries worn away the stone flags of the aisle, and which continue to do so today)

If we have this beautiful church it is because of those who have treasured it down the years. It may not have been entirely altruistic. The craftsmen in wood and stone who constructed the building probably needed a living wage. Their

names we know not. Those benefactors who are celebrated by name on memorials or in beautiful things – may have been expressing gratitude and devotion, but they were, perhaps consciously, also prolonging a memory of their mortal years. We would all like to linger on in the minds of others, wouldn't we? We are reminded us that the definition of the church is not just the building, but also the people who make up its living fabric.

We – the generations of the early years of the third millennium - are the heirs to all this. The weight of the examples of previous generations lies heavily on our shoulders. We are challenged in two ways:

Firstly to treasure and maintain this beautiful building – the support of the recently set up Friends of Great Bealings Church is central to this. In recent years we have done our bit – bringing in modern technology and facilities – mains water, a sound system, toilet and kitchen facilities – but maintenance of what we have remains a financial and practical challenge.

Secondly, in our ever more questioning age, we are challenged to sustain that spirit of spirituality and of Christian belief and values which inspired our ancestors to build, sustain and embellish our church. We are challenged to ask ourselves whether our individual place in the grand scheme of things is infinitely more complex than of our age of rampant materialism, militant secularism, cynical unbelief and twittering superficiality would have us believe. Our church remains a place where these deeper questions can be asked and debated, a place where one can quietly contemplate, away from the intrusive, stressful world, a place where one can walk around a beautiful churchyard, sharing it with the flora and fauna which have shared it with us for centuries. It is also a churchyard we share with the

interred memories of those who have gone before, some, our friends, possibly loved ones, are known to us, others, just names, names being gradually obliterated by the passage of time.

I have always enjoyed the Romantic poets, and much of what they write reflects the transience of things, set against the permanence of nature and the created world. The 19th century was the time both of the romantic poets and of the years that witnessed the golden resurgence of this church, so I will close by quoting Alfred Lord Tennyson – with words fit for a rural community and a country churchyard:

“Man comes and tills the fields, and lies beneath.”

The final word goes to Tennyson again. This comes from *In memoriam*, setting all human endeavour in its wider context:

“One God, one law, one element
And one far-off divine event
To which the whole creation moves”

It is in this wider context that we offer you an updated version of 1000 years of history of this one small village church, but one which has enjoyed the love and care generously and readily offered by many generations of the men and women of this village of Great Bealings.

Thanks to the hard work and creative talents of Norman Porter, the revised history and guide to St Mary's Church has now been completed. I think that I can safely speak for everyone in saying that it is a real treat. It is attractive to look at, with beautiful art work (thanks to the efforts of Chris Keeble) and it makes a very interesting and entertaining read. Not only does it tell us about the 1000 year history of the building and artifacts, it also, just as importantly, provides a

POSSIBLE RE-LAUNCH OF NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEME IN GREAT BEALINGS

Many people have been concerned about the recent spate of burglaries in and around our villages. This has moved Wendy Chard and Margaret Martin to offer to look into the possibility of re-launching our own Neighbourhood Watch schemes. The previous scheme has lapsed, perhaps because we had all been lulled into a sense of complacency by a number of relatively crime-free years. The benefits of any such scheme are that criminals tend to stay away from areas which have an active scheme. It is not about being nosy; it is about being observant and pro-active if you witness out-of-the-ordinary behaviour. Some insurance companies also give a discount if you are in a scheme! Wendy is prepared to run a scheme in the Lower Street area and has already obtained all necessary information from the local police. Other areas would need their own volunteer organiser.

We are using this Magazine and the local news service to distribute the necessary Questionnaire, to publicise Wendy's initiative, and to gauge the current level of interest in particular ar-

eas of the village. We do urge people who would like to participate in the scheme to respond positively to the questionnaire, and to return filled-in hard copies to Wendy (White Cottage, Lower Street) or Margaret (Lavender Cottage, Kiln Lane) by September 10th. **A minimum of 60% positive responses are needed**, in any particular locality (e.g. Lower Street area, Boot Street area) before any such scheme can be set up. Volunteer organisers for areas other than Lower Street will be needed.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN PRESENTATION BY MR CHARLES BARRINGTON & MR JAMES FIREBRACE

Both presentations showed Councillors what a lot of work has been done already. The "How? Who? and When?" of the Neighbourhood Plan was discussed as well as the need to set up a working party. It was resolved to write to SCDC in the first instance expressing our desire to prepare a Neighbourhood Plan. The first working group meeting will be held on the 6th September at

18:30pm in the Committee Room, Bealings Village Hall.

OPEN SESSION

Concern was raised by a resident who reported that the hump had been removed from the bridge in Boot Street thus contributing to the problem of speeding cars in Boot Street.

The leaking BT Box on Boot Street is an on-going problem. (it is thought that there is a natural spring causing an excess of water on the road)

REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR PETER BELLFIELD

SCC are not only on track to save £42.5 million but to exceed this by £13.5 million. Total amount saved £56 million.

Broadband – two providers have been short listed with the successful applicant being announced in September. It is hoped that all of Suffolk will have high speed broadband by March 2015.

WIND TURBINE PROJECT

The Chairman suggested having a public presentation/exhibition in September inviting residents of the three parishes; Great and Little Bealings and Playford. In view of the suggested location of the Wind Turbine it was agreed to invite Woodbridge Town Council and Martlesham Parish Council as well.

EAST ANGLIA ONE WIND FARM

Great Bealings would be opposing Phase 2 of the Consultation stage and would be writing formally. Mr Eric Barnett will meet with Mr Philip Watkins to discuss the proposals. For more information please visit:

Notes of the Parish Council Meetings held on 2 and 31 July 2012

PARISH COUNCILLOR RESIGNATION

Miss Dee Williams has resigned as a Parish Councillor. SCDC has not received any request for an election to be held and has therefore advised the Council to fill the vacancy as soon as possible by co-option. If you would like to become a Parish Councillor please contact the Clerk, details below.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The Suffolk Local Code of Conduct for Councillors has been adopted.

EAST ANGLIA ONE OFFSHORE WIND-FARM: PUBLIC CONSULTATION UNTIL 3 SEPTEMBER

Phase 2 of the applicants’ public consultation on the cabling has been extended until 3 September. The Council has considered the details of construction methodology, traffic and transport issues and resolved to continue to object to the cable being routed through Little Bealings. The Council is of the view that insufficient weighting has been given to the impact on the communities of Gt and Little Bealings in choosing the route and will pursue its objection direct with the Planning Inspectorate in due course.

POLICE

There have been two recorded crimes since the May meeting and the beginning of July: dwelling burglaries in Holly Lane and Martlesham Road. Constructors parking in Holly Lane had generated complaints and the police had requested reinstatement of the grass verge. School parking was being monitored, as was use of a private vehicular track which carried public footpath status. It was agreed that the Community Speed Watch scheme was not appropriate in respect of concern about speeding in Martlesham Road.

HOLLY LANE

A local resident is investigating whether Holly Lane would now meet the criteria for a 30mph speed limit to be applied.

CLOSURE OF THE ADMIRAL’S HEAD PUBLIC HOUSE

The Council has considered residents’ concerns about the closure and expressed its great regret and disappointment at the loss. There was concern that an application would be made in the future to SCDC for a change of use to residential use, but SCDC has advised that this would be contrary to Local Plan policy AP62 and LDF policy DM30 and, if made, would be likely to be refused. It was noted that there

seemed to be potential for a community run pub, with interest from some local residents in being involved. The Council would contact the publicans in respect of the drainage issue, the potential for a community run pub and to draw attention to concerns about the car park and new fencing.

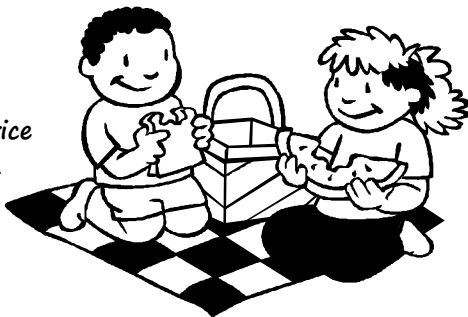
